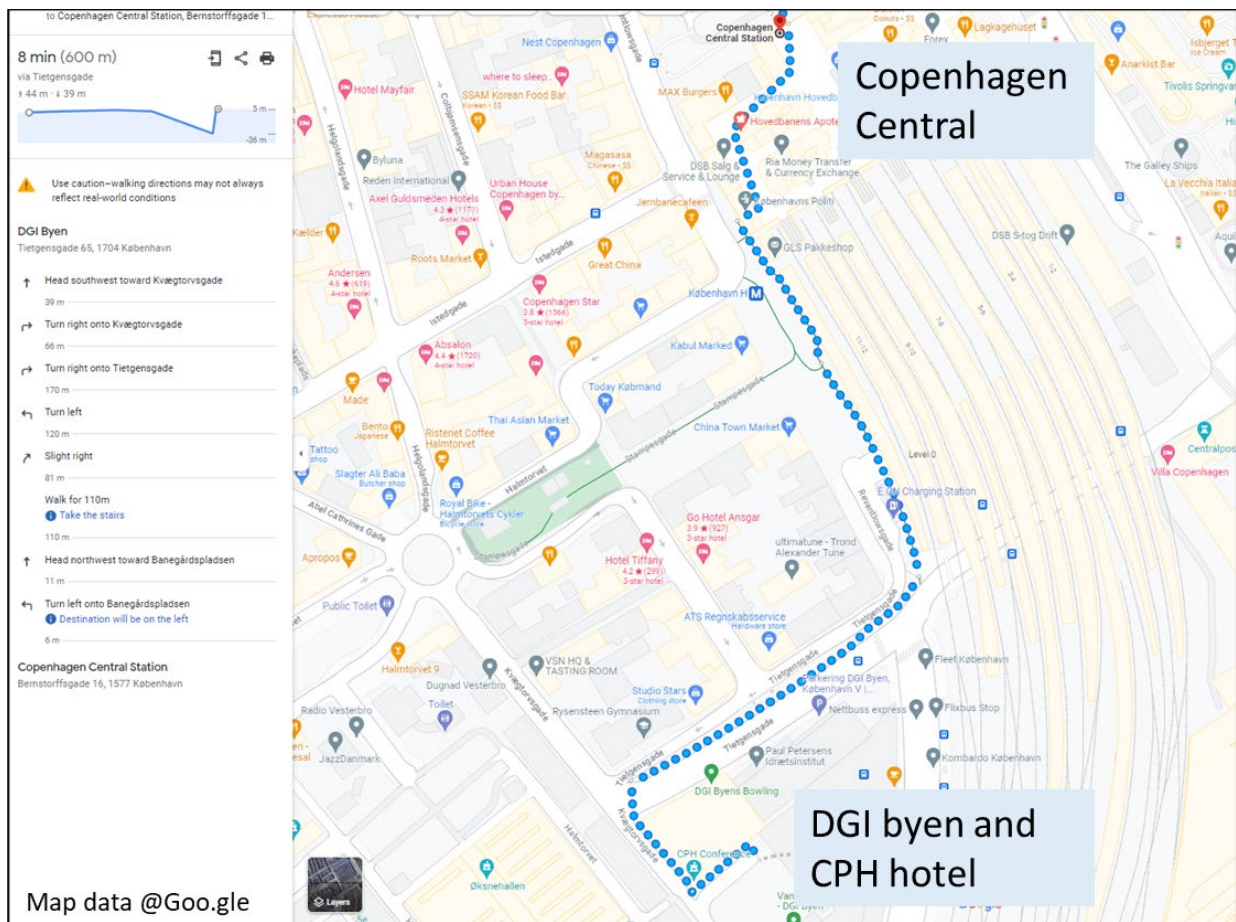


How to get to...

Planning your public transport in Denmark

Getting from Copenhagen Airport (CPH) to the centre of Copenhagen

If you arrive at Copenhagen Airport (CPH) the easiest and cheapest way to reach the centre of Copenhagen is by train or metro. After collecting your bags at the airport walk through customs, and out into the arrival hall (Terminal 3). Straight ahead inside the building (~75 m) is the DSB (railway) ticket office/vending machines, where individual tickets can be purchased (valid for all public transport). You can also use the “DSB” app or the “*rejsekort*” (see below for further details). Do not board any train, metro or bus without a valid ticket. If you do so nonetheless you risk being fined ~€100.

Regional and intercity trains link the airport with Denmark and southern Sweden. There are only two tracks at the airport, but if you go to the wrong one you will end up in Sweden, so please watch the monitors. The train ride to Copenhagen Central station (Københavns Hovedbanegård) will take about 15 min and has two stops before Copenhagen Central.

The metro station is located in extension of Terminal 3. The Metro runs in 4–6 minute intervals during the day and evening hours and at 15–20 minute intervals at night. However, note that the metro does not stop at Copenhagen Central station.

Of course, you can also choose to take a taxi directly from the airport to your destination. Taxi rates include a tip, and it is usually possible to pay by credit card. Some taxi companies may charge a fee for driving from CPH. A taxi to the venue will cost around €34.

Purchasing tickets for public transport

There are three ways to purchase tickets:

- 1) Individual tickets
- 2) Using the “*Anonymous Rejsekort*”
- 3) Using the “DSB app”

AD1) Individual tickets can still be purchased on buses (cash only), in metro and train stations or on your phone using a DSB app, but they tend to be more expensive than if purchased with a *Rejsekort*.

AD2) The “Rejsekort” (travel card) is an electronic ticketing system for travelling by bus, train and metro and works much the same way as an Oyster card. It is (fairly) easy to use but requires prepayment. It is however significantly cheaper to travel using a *Rejsekort* than to buy tickets individually. With a *Rejsekort Anonymus*, an “Adult” customer type will prepay ~€9 for a regional journey. Unfortunately, this card cannot be ordered online, but can be purchased at the airport or selected train stations, e.g., Roskilde station and Copenhagen Central Station. The card costs 80 kr (€11). With a *Rejsekort*, you must begin all journeys by checking in through a check-in card reader. If you change the means of transportation during your journey, you must remember to check in again. At the end of your journey, you must check out through a check-out card reader. When you check out, you will also be charged for your journey (see e.g., <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=YQJlaGFTHo0>).



With an “Anonomous *Rejsekort*” you can check in fellow travellers, your bike, or your dog on your card via *Rejsekort* vending machines or the “check-in extra” card reader. The card reader is marked with the word “Extra” at the top. There must be enough money on the card to cover the prepayment for the group.



To be able to travel, you must have money on your card. The balance of the card must, at a minimum, cover the prepayment of your next journey (i.e., 70 kr). You must top it up with at least DKK 100. You can always top a *Rejsekort* up at vending machine or in stations and kiosks (how to do this is shown here [warning: only in Danish]: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=zwNJHv1Ww9o>

AD3) The “DSB app”. Simply download the app and follow the instructions. It is easy to use but more expensive than the *Rejsekort*.
